THEME OF THE WEEK: He Suffered All the Penalties of Human Sin

Holy Week is the heart of the paschal mystery, the high point of the church year, and the oldest feast in the church's year of grace. Every day in Holy Week has a complete set of propers (Introit, Gradual, lessons, etc.), allowing for daily Communion as the baptized keep the New Testament Passover in sincerity and truth. Following the theme verse below, see how what was written "deep in prophets' sacred page, and grand in poets' winged word" (LSB 810.2) is fulfilled in Christ, "who accomplished the salvation of mankind by the tree of the cross that, where death arose, there life also might rise again" (Proper Preface for Holy Week).

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 21:1-9 The Son of Man Must Go to Jerusalem

Zechariah promised old Israel that her eternal King would enter old Jerusalem "humble and mounted on a donkey" (9:9). The hymn "Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates" (LSB 340.2) provides a 'sung sermon' on this Gospel Lesson and beckons you to enter the new Jerusalem. "A righteous Helper comes to Thee," for you cannot presume upon God's grace and help yourself to the King's banquet. "His chariot is humility" is in vivid contrast to the mighty chariots of Ephraim and the war horses of Jerusalem (Zech 9:10). "His kingly crown is holiness," which He shares with you through Holy Baptism, with the Divine compassion of "His scepter, pity in [your] distress." *Lord, O enter with Thy grace divine; Thy face of mercy on me shine (LSB 340.5). Amen.*

MON

SCRIPTURE: John 12:1-23 The Son of Man Must be Delivered to the Gentiles

Throughout John's Gospel we read that Jesus' hour "had not yet come." The final verse of today's reading, however, is a decisive turning point in the gospel: "The hour *has come* for the Son of Man to be glorified" (v. 23) in and through His cross. Thus, His anointing at Bethany was for His burial. Jesus' raising of Lazarus was a pretense to deliver Him to a kangaroo trial. His triumphant entry was His final journey to the city of His death. And above all, the arrival of Greeks who wished to see Jesus, proclaimed the good news that the new and greater Temple, Jesus' own body, was ready for His Passion. *Christ, my God, Who by death did trample death, Who, being One of the Holy Trinity is glorified with the Father and the Holy Spirit: save me! Amen.*

TUE

SCRIPTURE: John 12:24-43 The Son of Man Must be Lifted Up

"As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up" (Jn 3:14). Recall that old Israel was saved from death in beholding the serpent on the poll—not as a magic formula, but as an act of repentant faith. Likewise Jesus, lifted high on the cross, calls you not just to acknowledge the historic fact of His crucifixion, although that is a good start. Even more so, He calls you to believe that He is the Seed that bears the fruit of your salvation; to behold the One who was lifted up in the manner of the bronze serpent to crush the satanic serpent; and to receive the "glory that comes from God" (v. 43)—the glory of winning your salvation. *Your cross I place before me; Its saving power restore me, sustain me in the test (LSB 453.7) Amen.*

WED

SCRIPTURE: Luke 22:1-23; 42 The Son of Man Must be Betrayed into the Hands of Sinful Men

The late Archbishop and TV personality Fulton Sheen tells of being offered free cross necklaces from a local merchant, who had received them from some nuns who did not want to wear them because the crosses separated them from the world. The nuns donated thirty crosses and they were made of silver! This recalls how the Lord was betrayed from within, fulfilling Psalm 41:9, "The one who ate my bread has lifted his heel against me." Thus your salvation, O Sinner, happened "on the night [Jesus] was betrayed" that you might kiss the Son in faith, receive the eternal treasures of salvation, and live each day under the cross. *Hold Thou Thy cross before my closing eyes; shine through the gloom and point me to the skies (LSB 878.6). Amen.*

THU

SCRIPTURE: John 13:1-15 The Son of Man Came to Serve, not to be Served

How did tempestuous Peter react as Jesus scooted along the floor with a bowl of water and a towel? Foot washing was the menial task of the entry-level slave, certainly no job for the King of Israel! And yet, stripping down to His most basic garments, Jesus thoroughly washed each disciple's feet from accumulated dirt and filth. For if He, their Lord and Master, humbled Himself to serve them, then they must learn to serve one another. His service (and theirs) did not stop at the threshold of His betrayal and death. Jesus continues to serve you through your pastor in the Divine Service of the Lord's Supper, an everlasting memorial to the service He rendered on Golgotha. *Blood of Christ, refresh me. Water from the side of Christ, wash me. Amen.*

FRI

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 27:33-54 The Son of Man Must Suffer the Penalties of Human Sin

The account of Jesus' suffering and death in Matthew's gospel is perhaps best read alongside Psalm 22. Jesus quotes the opening words, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" but the entire Psalm finds its fulfillment in Jesus' Passion, where he is the Temple transfigured. Precisely in His Passion He is the once-for-all bloody sacrifice, the high Priest of greater things to come, and therefore the new and greater Temple—crucified by the unbelievers, but bound to rise again in three days. He now exercises His kingship with you (Ps 22:27–31) by sharing the blood of the atonement and the bread of His presence in the Passover transfigured, the Lord's Supper. *By Your cross and Passion, by Your precious death and burial: Help me, good Lord! Amen.*

SAT

SCRIPTURE: 1 Peter 3:17-22 The Son of Man Must be Made Alive in the Spirit

The Noahic narrative (Gen 6–8) is a microcosm of the severity of God's judgment and the magnitude of His grace: unbelievers die a horrible death; God's people live. In the New Testament, Jesus "double tapped" on this judgment when He descended into hell not to evangelize, but to proclaim His Lordship to the impenitent. God's grace to Noah and Jesus' descent into hell point ahead to His baptismal grace for you, especially this evening at Easter Vigil as the church around the world conducts baptisms, wherein they (and you) receive "a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ" (v. 21). *Lord, when Your glory I shall see and taste Your kingdom's pleasure, Your blood my royal robe shall be, My joy beyond all measure! (LSB 438.4). Amen.*
